Highlights of the 2006 MSUM Secondhand Smoke Study of Students and Faculty/Staff, February 2007

Study Design

Two surveys were conducted in October/November 2006, at Minnesota State University Moorhead (MSUM): a random sample of students and a census of faculty/staff. A total of 184 students participated, ensuring a representative sample of students with an error rate of 7% and a confidence level of 95%. A total of 272 faculty/staff participated. Preferences/Opinions Regarding Campus Smoking Policies

- 69% of students and 82% of faculty/staff at MSUM know the existing campus smoking policy.
- The vast majority of students and faculty/staff say the smoking policy is not enforced well outdoors.
- 43% of students and 66% of faculty/staff are *very likely* to support a smoke-free campus policy.
- Only 11% of students and 3% of faculty/staff say they would be less likely to attend or work at MSUM if a smoke-free campus policy was implemented.

Campus Community's Experiences with Tobacco and Secondhand Smoke

- 34% of students and 12% of faculty/staff are tobacco users; 13% of students and 7% of faculty/staff are "regular users" of tobacco.
- The vast majority of smokers start smoking before finishing high school.
- The greatest influence on smokers to start smoking is peers.
- Only 21% of students and 16% of faculty/staff are not interested in quitting smoking.
- Among smokers, 46% of students and 29% of faculty/staff have tried to quit smoking within the last 12 months. The majority of those trying to quit have had multiple attempts.
