a leading national research institution known as a place of impact. You are joining NDSU at an exciting time of growth and achievement.

In fall 2009, 14,189 students enrolled in our undergraduate and graduate programs, setting a record for the 10th year in a row. The total includes 2,103 graduate students and an all-time high of 1,171 international students.

With more than \$100 million in annual research expenditures, we are one of the largest research universities in the Northern Great Plains region. Our highly successful Research and Technology Park continues to build on its many accomplishments.

During the same period, the Extension Service had 536,614 face-to-face contacts with adult learners across the state.




ANGELINE WALSWICK
