# Civic Engagement Programs on campus by Matt Skoy

- -Community Engagement and what we do with the students at NDSU. His job consists of: Leadership Development; traveling with the students; and engaging with students.
  - Changes that have happened in student involvement: About 4 years ago, we had 30,000 student volunteer hours; in 2012 we had 51,123 student volunteer hours
  - He could show graphs and numbers, but there is something missing.
    - O For example, a student approached Matt after being involved in the Homeless and Hungry program. This student spent his winter break being homeless, staying outside and rooming in the homeless shelter. He would serve meals to other homeless people at the Salvation Army center every noon. One day an older gentlemen came up to him and ridiculed him "that is what is wrong with you kids these days, you volunteer here once and you may bring a few friends with you the next time and then you're done, you don't know what it's really like". The student told the man that he is also homeless and he sleeps at the Newman center every night and serves lunch at the Salvation Army, and the student wants to "serve him". The man broke down and told the student he was sorry. This student is changed forever. That cannot be included in the statistics.
