

The North Dakota State University
Peltier Complex is a state-of-the-art
learning facility. Designed to meet
federal and state food processing
and food handling regulations, the
center's laboratories will expand
research grant opportunities and
partnerships with federal and state
agencies.

Funding

In 2021, the North Dakota Legislature approved \$70 million for the completion of the facility and authorized an additional \$15 million in fundraising to expand and enhance research and teaching capacity at NDSU.

Unique aspects of the building

- The USDA Food Safety Inspection Service fully inspects the slaughter and meats processing facility.
- The retail store will sell a variety of NDSU-produced food products.
- The Food and Drug Administration inspected the Northern Crops Institute food production laboratories.
- A wide variety of teaching and learning spaces are available.
- Specialized laboratory space for:
 - Grain milling
 - Oil extraction
 - Meat processing
- Food processing and food science
- Sensory kitchen and laboratory
- Renewable fuel production

Unique architectural features

- Wheat motif perforated panels stretch from the first-floor exterior into the first-floor interior of the building.
- The terrazzo on the first floor depicts the Missouri River as it flows through the region.
- The story board on the first floor tells the story of the Peltier family and their involvement in North Dakota agriculture.
- The photos in the building show various aspects of North Dakota agriculture and the food products we produce.
- Natural light permeates much of the building through the central atrium.
